Are We Superstitious or Spiritual

Constitutional Review 2016—2017

Just over a year ago, the Elders recommended that Council review the current state of our church's Constitution. This was also recommended by the Visioning Committee, started almost 8 years ago, while Paul Durbin was still pastor.

A Constitutional Review Committee has been hard at work, looking over the old style Constitution and considering ways to make it more streamlined, while maintaining the content and intent of our predecessors. This team is currently made up of Stu Hicks, Diana Tyler, Glenn Swartz, Paula Krasnevich, Ed Carter, and Pat Ables. We were honored to have George Butcher as our chairman, before he had to step down due to health issues.

We have maintained most of the content of the current Constitution (dated Jan. 2004), and we have clarified many ambiguous articles with current grammar. We have re-ordered the content into a core Constitution and accompanying By-Laws. We have added an area to collect other governing documents of this congregation, such as Job Descriptions and binding resolutions of Council, like the Covenant Gift for Pathways. We have also collected some of the unspoken rules of the congregation into the By-Laws, like rules for use of the Fellowship Hall, and emergency spending limits for Budget line items.

This is an important document, and it takes time to get it right. The committee has worked for over a year, starting with a look at other church's documents, and carefully regarding the heritage of this congregation. We need a Constitution that reflects us and our ministry in North Eaton, and is useful to guide us. But it also must be balanced between being flexible to meet the times, and being steadfast enough to stand the test of time.

Our intent is to bring forth the revised documents for consideration by Council in February and again in April, before coming to the Congregation for approval. This will give everyone adequate time to look at them and make suggestions for improvement. Please talk with the committee members if you have any concerns.
